

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
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Tina Volfe *CASA Court Appointed Special Advocates

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FOR CHILDREN

n early 2017, as Tina Wolfe sat in the Butte County courthouse listening to the story of a seven-yearold boy's life falling apart, she felt her own heart falling apart too. Little Matthew seemed to be floundering in the foster care system, buffeted by the bad decisions of adults in his life. Thankfully, Tina was positioned to do something about Matthew's situation. She had just become a court appointed special advocate (CASA), sworn in before a county judge after six weeks of training. She eagerly accepted Matthew as her first CASA child, embarking on a life-changing journey.

CASA OFFERS SAFE MENTORS FOR FOSTER YOUTH IN THE NORTH STATE

Today, Tina is employed as the advocate supervisor for Butte County's CASA program through Northern Valley Catholic Social Service (NVCSS). CASA, which stands for Court Appointed Special Advocates, is a national program designed to support some of the most vulnerable children—those in foster care. CASA pairs foster youth with caring volunteers who have the legal right and responsibility to advocate for their CASA kids in court, at school and at each home in which the child lives. CASA advocates remain involved until their CASA kids are reunified with their parents, adopted or age out of foster care. Tina took the initial CASA training as a way to support children after she and her husband, Paul, became empty-nesters. Now her work involves training new CASA volunteers and shepherding existing CASAs through the complexities of their children's cases. She attends dependency court weekly, staying abreast of cases that currently have CASAs and cases that could most benefit from advocacy when new CASAs are available.

TINA WOLFE SUPPORTS VOLUNTEERS AND FOSTER YOUTH WITH PERSISTENCE AND AN OPEN HEART

Before accepting the advocate supervisor position, Tina had worked in corporate America for many years, including at a leadership and development company with Deme Jamson, whose son she had previously nannied. "My son called her 'my Tina," Deme says fondly. Deme describes Tina as "talented, smart, creative, honest, straightforward, kind, a team player and a leader—an all-around beautiful person and an extraordinary professional. I consider myself very lucky to have worked with her and to call her friend." When Tina decided to work for CASA, Deme knew it would be a perfect fit because Tina "can understand the legal system so quickly, she's brilliant and she's very passionate about kids." Deme adds, "I think Tina was put on this planet to help people—especially kids."

Lisa Michels, the advocate supervisor when Tina first became a CASA, recalls Tina engaging in the training with "an open heart" and jumping into advocacy with incredible persistence amid the flurry of placements, social workers and the unexpected twists and turns of foster care. "She does not let kids languish in the system," Lisa says. "She's strong, persistent and she has a huge heart. Sometimes as supervisors we have to do and say things that are hard, but she does all of it from her heart and I think that's the most important thing."

Foster advocacy does lay emotional weight on the heart. Tina recalls being able to put work aside when she worked in the business world but finds mentally separating from CASA work much more difficult. "The decisions we make affect the lives of children," she says. "It is important we take it seriously." At the same time, she recognizes her limits. "So much of this is out of our hands. I know that there might be a bigger plan that I'm not aware of. So I pray a lot!" She also makes time to refresh herself through walks with her husband and their two dogs, chats on the phone with her son, and crafting or decorating her home.

REWARDING CASA OUTCOMES

In January 2023, in the same courtroom that had brought Matthew into her life, Tina cried tears of joy as he was officially adopted into a loving family. During Tina's nearly five years as his CASA, Matthew moved five times, lived in four different cities, moved to five different schools

and had over 50 people (such as foster parents, foster siblings, teachers and therapists) enter and exit his life. Tina remained a constant for Matthew; one person he could trust and lean on during the years of turbulence. "I'm very grateful to Matthew for allowing me to be in his life and be his friend and advocate," Tina says. "I've had a couple of other cases over the years, including a sibling group of three sisters who were recently adopted and they have just been a joy in my life that I could never have imagined. Other than the birth of my own child, being at those two adoptions are the highlights of my life."

Currently, Butte County has approximately 50 CASAs each of whom work with only one child or one sibling at a time — and approximately 400 children in the foster system. Learn how you can make a difference in the lives of foster youth in your county by visiting nationalcasagal.org. ■

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to pause and appreciate the beauty around you. Take time to notice the sunrise in the morning, appreciate the fresh snow on the ground, watch squirrels chase each other and point these things out to your children. Show them how to taste their food, take deep breaths of fresh air and snuggle a little longer before bed. You don't have to stop participating in activities you and your kids enjoy, but when you have a free moment, pause to enjoy it.

NEW FRIENDS AND CONNECTIONS ENRICH YOUR LIFE

Encourage your children to meet new people and experience the joy of making a new friend. One of life's joys is connecting with other people and the experience of being part of a community. If you are at a park playing, encourage your child to say hello to another kid their age. If your child has a new classmate, suggest they go out of their way to include them at recess. Welcome a new neighbor by taking a plate of cookies to their door and introducing yourselves. This may be out of your comfort zone, but it is worth it to make a new friend. A great way to embrace life is through relationships with people in our community.

NEW ACTIVITIES AND HOBBIES TEACH A LOVE FOR LIFE

Offer support when your child expresses interest in trying something new or if they want to set a goal for themself. - **9 Months** Sit alone. Imitate gestures. Wave bye-bye.
- **12 Months** Take their first steps. Play with a variety of toys. Begin to say "mama."
- 18 Months Walk alone. Build a tower of three blocks. Use up to 15 words. Enjoy interacting with caregivers.
- 24 Months Begin to use two-word phrases to communicate. Eat and drink independently. Walk up and down stairs.

ikes to spectacular waterfalls, breathtaking starry nights, stories and music around a campfire, watershed education and history, epic water battles, jumping off rocks, swimming rapids, kayaking these are some of the fun activities that families can enjoy on rafting trips with River Dancers Whitewater Rafting Company located in beautiful Siskiyou County.

RIVER RAFTING ADVENTURES FOR CHILDREN AND FAMILIES OF ALL AGES

"It's such a lovely experience out on the river," says Marty Sochet, a River Dancer whitewater rafting guide who specializes in guiding family rafting trips. A marital and family therapist for 45 years, Marty specialized in working with dads and facilitated many men's groups. He combined his love of whitewater rafting with his counseling expertise to create "dads' rafting trips." Marty says, "We would go out on rafting trips to connect, have a good time and broaden our experience together."

The trips were such great fun that when many dads expressed the desire to share them with their kids, Marty expanded the rafting adventures to "dads' and kids'" trips. "Its' really fun because I'm not a very intimidating person and I make a great target for water guns, so the kids would really gang up on me and the dads loved it," Marty says. "Over the years, a lot of women expressed the desire to join these trips, so they eventually expanded to whole family trips, and it became an annual tradition."

Marty still guides men's group trips on the upper Sacramento River early in the year. "But the Klamath is a warm water river, so it's a great experience for kids," Marty says. "It's a great privilege to take kids down the river. The sweetest thing is to see the kids wake up in the morning with sleepy eyes, sticking their heads out of their sleeping bags." However, Marty explains, some family rafting trips include grown children and their parents who set out to experience this exciting adventure together!

BUILDING A COMMUNITY ON THE RIVER

A longtime guide for River Dancers, Marty says guiding these family trips is a labor of love. "There's nothing like getting off the river, setting up a tent

and building a community. Kids do pitch in, but invariably the kids just want to play." Although he describes himself as a "latent camp counselor," Marty says for the most part, kids and parents get along well on these trips because they are out of their normal environment and they are having fun. "Sometimes parents get into a conversation with me about a particular challenge they are having, but most of my work is being a river guide and focusing on safety."

Marty runs a special group family trip in July each year, scheduled this year July 26, 27 and 28. But families can book trips through River Dancers any time during the summer. River Dancers owner, Aaron Beverly, 23

recommends the Tree of Heaven run, about 20 minutes from Yreka, as appropriate for all ages and the best run for families with small children as young as 3 years old. "Some young children might be bothered by getting splashed at first," he says, "but they quickly get used to it and enjoy the ride. This is a class II run, so there are some fun rapids and it is also a very relaxing trip. Teenagers enjoy it and we bring inflatable kayaks for them to use during the run."

RIVER DANCERS OFFERS RELAXING, REJUVENATING, INCLUSIVE EXPERIENCES

Aaron says, "Everyone is always happy on the river. I used to be a mountain guide and I observed that people were cold and tired and stressed when mountain climbing. It's different on the river. It's warm; its relaxing. The river puts people in a good mood. It relieves tension. Families spend the whole day together on the

river enjoying sandy beaches, good food, just hanging out. People want to come back and in fact, they do year after year. From the guides' perspective it's great to see the kids grow up over the years."

River rafting trips include what Aaron calls "river gourmet" meals with dinners such as sushi, Pad Thai, pesto risotto, gumbo, spaghetti and meatballs, burritos and tacos. Lunches are deli style sandwiches and wraps. Breakfasts are often vegie scrambles, pancakes or fancy bagels. "You won't go hungry!" Aaron says. They cater meals to accommodate vegetarian, vegan, dairy-free, gluten-free diets and food allergies.

They also offer adaptive river rafting trips for families with cognitive and/or physical special needs. "We partner with Rotary Club of Mount Shasta, which, for the last 30 years, has provided financial support and volunteers to help with caregiving to provide caregivers a break for the day," says Aaron. "These trips are free;

use of boats and gear is donated by River Dancers and our guides volunteer to lead the trips." They can also accommodate families with special needs throughout the rafting season. Call River Dancers to make arrangements. If you would like to support these special trips, have questions about the Rotary volunteers or the Rotary Club of Mt. Shasta, call Donna Boyd at (530)925-4750.

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
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
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CHEERING FAMILIES TO SUCCESS AT LINCOLN STREET SCHOOL

ndrea Martin's goal in life can be found in her job title at Lincoln Street Independent School, an independent study option based in Red Bluff. Since 2019, Andrea has worked there as the Family Success Liaison. "Family success looks different for every family," Andrea says. "In whatever unique challenges each family is facing, I want to help locate the resources they need with the goal of stabilization."

Kindness opens up a child's world

Andrea's passion to help students and their families can be traced back to a time as a child at Gerber Elementary when her life was anything but stable. "I was weighed down by poverty and trauma and could never imagine rising above those circumstances. The instability was crippling—I never knew if I would be picked up right after school or three hours later. It usually was the latter. My teacher at the time, Polly Deknikker, noticed me sitting on the curb and she said, 'no more." Andrea became Polly's after-school assistant that day. It didn't matter if Andrea was banging erasers or correcting papers, being in Polly's presence always felt glamorous. "She carried herself with dignity and she always wore lipstick," Andrea said with admiration. "She opened up the world for me and made me believe I could rise above my circumstances."

Social emotional learning helps children be their best selves

One of Andrea's favorite roles at Lincoln Street is as the "Champion of Social Emotional Learning" through which she helps students be the best versions of themselves. Her goal is to focus on the whole child and to help them hone their unique character skills. Her weekly Teen Chat gives her a regular opportunity to speak to her students about real-life challenges. Andrea's vibrant smile, complete with lipstick, of course, lights up the online chat and you can hear the admiration in her students' voices.

"Where are you on your mood meter today?" Andrea asks the teens. When the students express a lack of energy, Andrea suggests, "Try drinking a tall glass of ice water. It gives me a boost every time."

Jill Kelly, a Lincoln Street parent, has two children who attend Andrea's chat. Jill says, "The chat has offered my kids an invaluable outlet-being a part of a team and learning valuable life and leadership skills. Andrea has given 110% of herself to our school, kids and families. Andrea is the heart of our school."

Another school parent, Faith Yount, describes Andrea as, "The person everyone not only wants but needs in their life. Andrea continually gives support and encouragement without complaint. Always smiling, coming up with new ideas, an excellent connector and full of knowledge about resources in our community-all while making people feel loved and val-

Meeting basic needs helps kids focus on learning

Andrea recalls the one event that changed her life forever. "That day I was sitting in the classroom when Mrs. Deknikker took a phone call. When she hung up the phone, she informed me that I needed to go to the library after school—I thought I was in trouble," Andrea says. "When I went to the library I saw beautifully wrapped boxes that nearly reached the ceiling. They were all for me! The boxes contained a complete new wardrobe—from shoes all the way up to a cross necklace. Without a word, I just knew the gifts were from Mrs. Deknikker. I found out later that Mrs. Deknikker, with the help of another teacher, Nancy Compton, had purchased everything just for me." Polly told Andrea, "You deserve even more."



"Polly and Nancy showed me that I was seen, heard and loved and that is something I want to show our Lincoln Street students and their parents." Andrea explains. "Homeschooling isn't easy and our parents and sometimes grandparents, need a lot of encouragement and support as they take on their role as their children's primary teacher."

Karla Stroman, principal of Lincoln Street, says, "Andrea provides a critical link between our families and our school. With the relationships she has developed, families know that they can reach out to her when they need help with support - food, clothing, shelter and even mental health. When basic needs are met our Lincoln Street students can focus on academics and other life skills necessary for success!"

Giving back to the community inspires and guides career choice

Working at Lincoln Street Independent School, within the Tehama County Department of Education, has been full circle for Andrea. She explains, "My first job, at age 15, was also under Karla Stroman in the SERRF (Safe Education and Recreation for Rural Families) program. Even with jobs and much of my education centered around children, I kept thinking I should go after a career in HR." Andrea laughs and then continues, "After receiving my degree in Organizational Leadership at Simpson I joined AmeriCorps to give back to my community. Working there as a School Readiness Home Visitor I found that I loved working with parents and seeing a lightbulb go off when I told them 'You are your kid's first teacher." So it was truly like coming home to be chosen for the job at Lincoln Street School. "I am the

caregivers' cheerleader. What could be more fun?" Andrea says, flashing her brilliant smile.

Even away from work, Andrea continues with that "Polly way" of helping others. Andrea sits on too many committees to mention but shares about one that has been a highlight-the Community Engagement Initiative. Andrea was able to work alongside her own daughter, Hailey, to provide both teacher and student perspectives on the initiative. Andrea shared, "We were able to give our input on how schools can take on a whole child approach and not just focus on academics."

Volunteering at Camp Hope for three years has helped Andrea with her vision for her current job. "We are a family," Andrea explains. "Over the years, I have learned that when times get tough, we should all be able to reach out to our village and ask for help, even if we don't quite know how. We are all struggling with something that no one knows about and I think asking for help is the greatest strength someone truly can express. Asking for help is not a weakness. We all need support and care. There have been so many mistakes that I have learned from with the help of mentors and friends and I want to pay it forward for life." -

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
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

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

Sensory-Friendly Vacation Ideas

Summer vacation with the family is a chance to break away from the routine, explore new destinations and create lasting memories together. However, for parents of children with disabilities, especially those with sensory issues, the thought of traveling can cause anxiety rather than excitement.

Finding destinations catering to your child's needs without compromising on fun can be challenging, but it's achievable with some thoughtful planning. Here are some sensory-friendly vacation ideas to consider for your next family trip.

Activities and experiences in nature help sensory integration, mindfulness and more

From national parks to forests and lakes, the serenity and natural beauty of the outdoors can be soothing and offer a tranquil environment free from the overwhelming stimuli of crowded tourist spots. Fortunately for us, the North State has an abundance of beautiful nature retreats to choose from. Getting out into nature is particularly beneficial for children with sensory issues, as it offers a serene backdrop that supports stress relief, mindfulness and grounding activities, helping children with sensory sensitivities to manage overload more effectively.

Activities in nature, such as walking barefoot or swimming, allow for unique experiences and encourage physical activity, which is crucial for sensory integration. Additionally, nature's calming effect can enhance focus, cognitive function and social-emotional development by providing a relaxed setting for interaction and exploration. The flexibility and tranquility of natural settings make them ideal for children seeking relief from the sensory overload experienced in more urban, crowded environments.

Tranquil Northern California and Oregon beaches offer relaxation, fewer crowds

Going to the beach in the summer with kids for a relaxing experience can seem counterintuitive, but finding less crowded beaches or visiting during offpeak times can keep the experience enjoyable and relatively stress-free. There are many beautiful, less populated beaches along the Northern California and Oregon coast. This environment promotes stress relief and relaxation while encouraging physical activities beneficial for sensory regulation.

Theme parks with sensory-friendly initiatives

Many theme parks have made significant efforts to become more inclusive and cater to guests with disabilities, including those with sensory processing challenges. These parks often provide specialized amenities such as quiet areas for decompression and disability access passes, allowing guests to avoid long waits for attractions.

In California, theme parks like Disneyland and Disney California Adventure in Anaheim, Universal Studios Hollywood in Los Angeles, SeaWorld San Diego and Legoland California in Carlsbad have implemented measures to assist disabled guests. These include Disability Access Service (DAS) and Attraction Assistance Pass (AAP), which provide ride return times, reducing wait times. Additionally, all parks offer quiet spaces or rooms to accommodate guests needing a break from sensory stimulation. Universal Studios and SeaWorld also have staff trained specifically to support guests with sensory issues and Legoland offers "Hero Passes"

for immediate access, enhancing the experience for guests with disabilities.

Planning tips for a sensory-friendly vacation

Preparation is Key: Before you travel, familiarize your child with the destination through pictures, videos and stories. This can help reduce anxiety about new experiences.

Pack Sensory Tools: Don't forget to bring along any sensory tools or toys that your child finds comforting, such as noise-canceling headphones, weighted blankets or familiar items from home.

Flexibility in Schedule: Keep your itinerary flexible. Be ready to modify plans based on your child's comfort and needs.

Vacations are a time for relaxation, exploration and joy. By choosing sensory-friendly destinations and making accommodations for your child's needs, you can ensure that your family holiday is enjoyable and memorable for everyone. Remember, the goal is to create positive experiences and lasting memories, so choose the option that best suits your family's unique preferences and needs. ■



Growing Healthy Kids



Before you enter Alua's Thrive Bar, you are met with a beautiful quote on the wall from Maya Angelou: "My mission in life is not merely to survive, but to Thrive; and to do so with some passion, some compassion, some humor, and some style." This is exactly what you experience at Alua's Thrive Bar.

THE BEGINNING OF A THRIVING BUSINESS

Alua's Thrive Bar, a superfood café and kombucha brewery featuring healthy meals for locals on the go, began seven years ago when Nion and Rebecca Sheppard started a small kombucha brewery called Infinity Kombucha that quickly became popular at local farmers markets and began having their product featured in local

restaurants. At first, they never saw themselves having a full restaurant. But they noticed there were no restaurants or cafes in Mount Shasta that exclusively sold high quality, health-centered food and drinks. They had outgrown their tiny brewing space, so they begin a two-year intensive makeover of a building that had previously served as a large thrift store. On Jan. 1, 2021, taking 43

a difficult business gamble in the middle of the COVID pandemic, they opened their doors as Alua's Thrive Bar, a grab-and-go café serving cold pressed juices, kombucha, wraps and superfood smoothies. Living up to their namesake, they begin to thrive and became known as Mount Shasta's healthiest cafe.

VISION FOR A THRIVING COMMUNITY

Nion and Rebecca didn't want to just serve healthy food. They wanted to create a space where people had a place to support their own healthy choices and, through food and community, learn how to thrive. They saw many people in their community stuck in a cycle of, as Nion calls it, "health mediocrity," relying on fast food and gas station grab-and-go's. Their goal was to provide a space where people could break out of those patterns and begin to thrive by providing fast healthy foods and a meeting space for those seeking or maintaining positive changes in their lives.

They saw that often the only option people had for healthy eating was to sit down for a full meal at a restaurant and there were very few true vegan and gluten-free menus. For someone who wanted healthy options for their 30-minute lunch break, there was no place in South Siskiyou County where they could 44





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go. Efficient, healthy food prep became their focus and this would lead to them become innovators in their field. They have created a menu of quickly prepared meals that cater to vegans, vegetarians and gluten-free diets, with some carnivore options such as turkey, chicken breast or eggs.

THRIVE BAR'S FAST AND HEALTHY MEALS AND SMOOTHIES

The wait time is 10 minutes or less for any of their delicious meals, including a variety of acai bowls, avocado toasts, bagels or the option to build your own bowl, allowing people on their lunch breaks or heading out to climb Mount Shasta to have an energizing, high quality, healthy meal. Thrive also offers superfood smoothies, with add-ons such as a Probiotic Boost, Supergreen Boost, Vitamin C or Collagen. 




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Eight Budget Friendly Updates to Give Your Home an Extra Pop




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
